



What's Hot in Yokohama

Tuesday 25 March, 2014

The IPPC WG2 opening speeches, chaired by a tired looking IPCC chairperson RK Pachauri, were fairly short. It seemed to take longer for the journalists in the room to leave than it took to deliver the short messages (*mostly video taped*) from a series of important people, including UNFCCC head Christina Figueres, UNEP Head Achim Steiner and WG2 co-chairpersons Dr Chris Field and Dr Vincente Barros.

The WG2 report has based a large part of its messaging on a risk-based approach. This is causing difficulties for countries that are concerned that in some case such an approach makes climate change sound like a "manageable" risk. Fortunately most parties are being constructive about this to date but progress has been slow as country representatives developed a shared understanding of the new terminology, for instance, in which cases it is acceptable to replace "impacts" with "risks" and in which it is not.

There is generally a strong push to keep the report focused on adaptation and impacts and resistance to making any strong inferences about mitigation as representatives do not want to prejudge the outcomes of working group 3.



The most difficult debates during the day was when some Latin American countries made a push for "Mother Earth" terminology to be incorporated in the text but they conceded the point in the end in the face of arguments from the authors and others that this language is not used in the source literature outside of the chapter on indigenous knowledge. Judging by how hard these parties fought



to have the "Mother Earth" terminology incorporated and by how they emphasised its use in other UN bodies this debate will likely crop up again.

There was a also an interesting slight debate on whether WG 2 should just consider the impacts of anthropogenic climate change or climate impacts in general. In today's meeting the viewpoint that WG 2 should cover both seemed to win out through text that allowed for both interpretations.

In terms of progress there was generally constructive dialogue between negotiators with all speakers trying to find constructive solutions. The wealth of inputs did unfortunately lead to slow progress and we only managed to work through a half page introduction and two

information boxes.

Parties postponed a sensitive discussion on whether to use the terminology "medium, low and high income countries" or "developed and developing countries". This will be discussed later in a contact group and the sense in the room was that this would be a very difficult debate, possibly influenced by UNFCCC dynamics where some parties are trying to move away from the hard binary distinction while others want to keep the firewall between developed and developing countries very clear...

There was some discussion about how to capture the fact that most of the climate research still comes from developed countries and what the implications of that are.
